As the goal is to have FOSS4G be THE premier GIS conference each year, it 1 stands to reason that it would need to provide several compelling reasons in the GIS spectrum, besidees specific software tools. The presentations were very well done, and I enjoyed the variety. I suggest making the classes longer (35-40 min) with 5 min in between. What about a tract just for general GIS? Such as best practices to setup a spatial database, or to maintain it, or to improve it. When is using PostGres inheritance a useful idea? What changes does that need? How about best database practices in general? It's one thing to know that program X can do a zillion cool things, another thing to know how to do them, and something else entirely to know when or why to do them. How about courses on Spatial Statistics and Analysis, independent of software platforms or programs? How about a review of analysis techniques or options? How about showcase more GIS problem solving? How about basic geospatial programming options? There are dozens of courses, workshops, and presentations that could be added to draw in more people. Whether the license or code used to do it is open or closed would be a minor point, though free software options to all attendees would rule the day. Then the applications would sell themselves. If FOSS4G wants to attract more people or increase FOSS influence, it would help to invite government organizations or representatives, perhaps even with an intro class like there was Tuesday. State GIOs would be a primary target for this. Offer a free conference ticket or two. Have local OSGeo chapters suggest their state (or other governmental) GIO to receive an invitation. Have them present the invitation. Include a dedicated VIP/Invitee dinner or lunch along with an intro presentation. Universities were correctly identified as a weak FOSS4G link in the US. Invite specific GIS faculty from universities within 400 miles. If possible, give them free conference tickets also and group them with the state GIO. Here in Idaho, a lot of the state GIS is still in a formative stage and therefore a good candidate for FOSS4G. Such states and Universities (creating a geography department or offering a new GIS emphasis in their program) would be perfect beneficiaries. Again, local OSGeo or GIS User groups would be able to make suggestions for such recipients. State governments have several large organizations that might be interested in these options. How about a special course on setting up SDIs and standards? (Our state has a severe lack of standards but wants everyone to use everyone else's data.) Another idea. PostGIS presentations were always heavily attended. What about a PostGIS conference or conference add-on of sorts before the rest of FOSS4G kicks off? (Similar to SOTM.) This would add to the regular presentations, which give more overviews, by providing depth for those who want more than an intro workshop or 30-min presentation. Another idea: Provide open labs for those who want to get started with a program or stack. Staffed by volunteers to help walk someone through setup or use. Keep some people on hand for the major FOSS4G players - PostGIS, QGIS, GeoServer, etc. A related idea. In these open labs have people and/or times setup to help users with their data. People can get questions answered and even bring sample data sets. How do I get dataset A into my database? How do I get dataset B out of my database? How can I improve my data structure? I'm moving a horrid collection of shapefiles, personal and file geodatabases, spreadsheets, etc. into a geodatabase. How do I know I'm setting up a good data structure or schema? Another idea. GISP courses, updates, reviewing, coaching, etc. The networking sessions (Wednesday night) didn't really seam to work like I'd imagined. I like the idea. Another idea. Have some meeting places available for those wanting to discuss/setup/contribute to regional GIS groups, whether OSGEO or GIS User groups, etc. I propose integrating GIS open source with existing user groups,

	meaning we need to reach out to them and provide some kind of presence. I prefer this to specific OSGeo groups, where it presents a kind of "one or the other" situation. The result is local GIS user groups being almost entirely ESRI marketing seminars. Another idea. Present community service projects (of the GIS or FOSS4G type) and perhaps present some kind of award(s) or recognition. Yes, open source tends to have lots of community contributors, but recognition of exceptional service (not just contribution), such as OSGeo Japan with the tsunami, would inspire. It focuses on the USE of the software, not just the tool creation. It puts geospatial open source, GIS in general, and FOSS4G in a very positive light. Submit some kind of media blurb and some photos/graphics to local media outlets where the project was done (or where the people are from). Another idea. Organize some kind of community service either during the conference. Inspire local groups to develop service projects. This helps community recipients as well as those serving, contributing towards GISP requirements. Another idea. Create some sort of GIS teaching ideas or lessons. This can go along with the service idea. Get GIS and FOSS4G in front of elementary, junior high, and high school students. Again, it also helps the contributor with GISP requirements, helps the community, and promotes FOSS4G doesn't need to do it all, just help to setup the framework, inspire, and provide an atmosphere where these can get started. Letters, emails, websites, are all inexpensive. Conference tickets are a commodity it can use to add value to its invitations. If FOSS4G needs to be the premier GIS conference, make it so.
